Register on-line via the WWCC web page from home. Go on-line to the Mustang WebAdvisor menu or call 789-3988 for your login ID and password.

Students must see their academic advisor prior to registering.

Mail-in Registration:

Fill out the form in this publication (page 29) and mail with the appropriate tuition and fees. Use your Visa or MasterCard!

Telephone Registration:

Review the registration form in this publication.

Have all information requested on that form available when you place the call.

Call 789-3988 or 789-0519 or 789-2950 and say you wish to register by telephone.

Telephone registrations must be paid by Visa or MasterCard at the time of registration.

Late Registration: January 18 - 20

Must be completed in person or use Mustang WebAdvisor the first 3 days of the term. Students may register for classes that begin at a later date through the first 2 days of the class or as prorated for shorter classes.

Payment Dates:

Part Time Students (Students taking 11 or fewer credits)

Friday, January 6 - Students registering after January 6 must pay at the time of registration. If payment is not received, or proof of approved financial aid available, courses will be voided. Students enrolled in 6 or more credits may set up a Payment plan consisting of 3 payments. \$50 setup fee applies.

Full Time Students (Students taking 12 or more credits)

Friday, January 6 - Intent Deposit - \$250.00

The intent deposit must be received by January 6 to hold your seat in courses for the upcoming term. Students receiving financial aid (an award letter must have been signed and returned to the college) are not required to pay the intent deposit. If payment is not received, or proof of approved financial aid available, courses will be voided. If students plan not to attend it is their responsibility to withdraw from courses. Students enrolled in 6 or more credits may set up a payment plan consisting of 3 payments. \$50 setup fee applies.

January 27 – Balance of cost of attendance for full-time students. See page 4 for refund schedule.

REGISTRATION AND GENERAL INFORMATION

Getting registered for Western classes is a simple process. If you are a **part-time** (11 or fewer credit hours) student, simply come in, mail in, or phone in your registration. Payment is due at the time of registration.

If you are going to be **full-time or degree seeking**, make sure you have:

- Completed the application for admission
- Submitted official transcripts from your high school and all colleges you have attended
- Taken the COMPASS test or provided ACT or SAT documentation
- Met with an Advisor
- Registered for courses
- Paid intent deposit or have financial aid in place by January 6.

Full-time and degree seeking students must meet with an academic advisor. Students should attend the orientation program provided for degree seeking students (see below).

Students who have been out of high school longer than 5 years may submit only a copy of their high school diploma or GED certificate along with any college transcripts.

If you are interested in scholarships or have standardized test scores that might allow you to waive placement test requirements, please submit ACT or SAT scores.

Forms may be picked up from and returned to the WWCC Evanston Outreach Office.

We encourage you to register early so that we can make good decisions about the need to cancel classes because of low enrollment!

Audit

Any student may sign up for a credit course with a no credit option. You may attend the class and choose whether you do assignments, take tests and complete projects. No grade is issued under this option. **The cost is the same per credit hour rate.** Decisions to take courses for audit must be made within the add period of the course.

Placement Tests

Western requires all full-time students and any part-time student who is enrolling in English, math and US Government to take the COMPASS Placement Test. This is a national standardized assessment designed to help students succeed in college-level coursework. It will tell us exactly where you need to start and Western has classes at all levels. If you have high enough ACT or SAT individual test scores, you may be exempt from taking the COMPASS. Please contact the office for more information.

Students should also carefully monitor their reading score. Reading is critical for success in all college-level courses and poor reading ability often results in problems in classes. Please enroll in the appropriate required reading courses.

The COMPASS is given at the WWCC Evanston Outreach. Please schedule appointments at 789-3988. Students may retake the exam once per semester. The cost for retakes is \$10. **Students with high ACT scores (21 or higher) may be exempt from the Placement Test.**

Attendance is **required** for all new students. Transfer students and returning WWCC students who have completed fewer than 12 credit hours and/or have a cumulative Grade Point Average of less than 2.0 are also required to attend.

Topics covered will include advisement, registration policies and procedures and adjustment.

TUITION/FEES AND GENERAL INFORMATION

The College Board of Trustees reserves the right to alter tuition and fees at any time by the amount necessary to maintain the institution or as required by the Wyoming Community College Commission.

All tuition and fees are due on the designated dates on the account statement. All checks or money orders should be made payable to Western Wyoming Community College. Special fees for laboratory supplies, etc., remain the financial responsibility of each student. The tuition schedule is for full-time credit students who take twelve or more credit hours and part-time credit students who take eleven or fewer credit hours. This tuition is a per-semester cost.

Refund and repayment for Federal Financial Aid recipients may be different.

VISA and MASTERCARD accepted

In addition to tuition, special fees are charged for laboratory science courses and certain activity courses. These fees are subject to change without notice. See fee schedule.

The refund goes into effect the first day of class. A portion of tuition and fees will be refunded based upon these dates. Full semester class dates (January - May) are listed. Please check with the office on the refund schedule for shorter block courses.

Return of Title IV funds

Students who withdraw during the first 60% of the semester and who receive assistance from the Federal Student Aid programs may possibly have some of their funds (unearned aid) returned to the federal program(s). The student can be liable for repaying their portion of this return. Prior to withdrawal, students should consult with the Financial Aid Office.

Western Undergraduate Exchange

If you have not been a Wyoming resident for at least one year, you may be subject to out-of-state tuition rates. There is a Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) reduced cost program available to students who live in surrounding states. Please contact the WWCC Evanston Outreach Office for details.

Academic Portfolio/Capstone Courses

Students planning to graduate;

Do you know about WWCC's Assessment Graduation requirement? All students graduating from WWCC with an Associate Degree, must complete one of the following options:

Take the Assessment Portfolio Course (1 credit)

In the Assessment Portfolio course (HMDV 2410), you compile a collection (or portfolio) of papers, speeches, photos and other artifacts that showcase your skills and abilities in communication, information retrieval, solving problems, seeing issues from multiple perspectives and developing life skills. This evidence of your skills is posted on one of our web servers and becomes an electronic portfolio that you can show to other colleges or employers.

-OR-

Complete Online Assessment Test

The Assessment consists of several tests to assess how effectively the College is accomplishing the Goals for Student Success. This will provide the College with information to continuously improve the teaching and learning process to benefit you. Contact the Evanston Outreach for information.

Getting Financial Assistance

Students enrolled in a **minimum of six credits** at Western Wyoming Community College are encouraged to apply for financial aid. Some students enrolled in less than 6 hours may also be eligible for financial aid. There are generally two types of aid available at WWCC: aid based on assessed financial need and aid awarded based on academic excellence or area of major.

Students interested in Federal Aid or WWC Foundation grants must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Applications can be accessed from the WWCC Financial Aid webpage. Before financial aid awards are disbursed, students must have applied and been accepted for admission, and be degree seeking at WWCC.

April 1 is the priority deadline for financial aid at WWCC. Applications received by this date will receive priority consideration for all available monies. Applications received after that date will be processed as the financial aid file is completed.

Financial Aid Awards usually consist of a combination of the following:

Federal Aid Programs:

Federal Pell Grant – Federal grant money available to qualifying students attending approved post-secondary institutions.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG) - Federal grants available to students with the lowest family contribution.

Federal Stafford Loans:

Subsidized Loans – Need-based federally subsidized loans available to college students which are funded by the Federal Direct Loan Program. Current interest rate is fixed at 6.8%, and repayment obligations begin six months after the student completes their education or stops attending on a part time basis. Entrance and exit counseling is required in order to receive these funds.

Unsubsidized Loans – Non-need based Federal loans available to college students which are funded by the Federal Direct Loan Program. Interest rate is fixed at 6.8%. Entrance and exit counseling is required in order to receive these funds.

Federal PLUS Loans – Federal loans available to parents whose children attend post-secondary institutions. Interest rate is fixed at 8.5%. Repayment begins immediately after loan disbursement.

Institutional Aid Programs:

Western offers a variety of scholarships to high school seniors based on academic performance and ability. They include the Superior Student Scholarship, Honor Scholarship, Performance Scholarship, Opportunity Scholarship, and Career Scholarship (award includes State of Wyoming funds for Hathaway eligible students), and Competition and Special Ability Grants. Divisional Scholarships are available to sophomore students.

Western also offers a variety of scholarships to students that have been out of the classroom for a period of time, may be transferring to WWCC or plan to attend part-time. They include the Excellence in Academics Scholarship, Non-traditional Student Scholarship, Transfer Student Scholarship and the Part-time Student Scholarship. WWC Foundation Aid:

Grants provided through donor participation, ranging in value from \$250-\$2,500 per academic year.

Veteran's Benefits:

Information and applications can be obtained from the Veteran's Representative in the Financial Aid Office, and online on the College's webpage.

Mustang WebAdvisor Capabilities:

Students can access a variety of financial aid information via Mustang WebAdvisor accessed through Mustang Cruiser.

- Students can view their award letter for the current academic year once their financial aid file is complete and the financial aid office has reviewed their eligibility and packaged their awards.
- Students can also accept or decline the aid that has been offered to them utilizing this medium.
- It also will direct them to the Master Promissory Note (Student Loan Application).
- Students can view their financial aid status by year or specific term.

GENERAL INFORMATION

How do I buy my books?

Students will be responsible for ordering their own textbooks. See page 15 for more information. The Evanston staff will assist students ordering their books online from the WWCC Bookstore at www.wccbookstore.com. You will need a credit card in order to use the on-line bookstore. Please feel free to ask an Evanston staff member for help.

What are the rules about attending class?

Each instructor sets his or her own attendance policy. Instructors may drop students from class for excessive absenteeism. It is in your best interest to attend class regularly. **The number one reason students fail classes is lack of attendance and subsequent lack of understanding of expectations and deadlines for assignments.** If you must miss a class for some reason, let your instructor know through the Mustang Cruiser email. If you are going to miss class for an extended period, call Allen Calmes in the WWCC Evanston Outreach Office.

How do I drop or withdraw from classes?

Students must sign a drop form by the established drop deadline in order to drop or withdraw from a class. Students must officially drop courses to avoid failing grades. The signed drop form must be submitted to the Outreach Office. **The drop deadline for Spring full-semester classes is March 30.** Check the academic calendar, or with the office, for drop dates of classes that are shorter.

Waitlists

Students may be placed on a waitlist if a course is full. When a seat becomes available, the student will be sent an **email** (using Mustang Cruiser or a personal email address) notifying them that a seat has become available. The student will have three days to add the course to their schedule through "Managing My Waitlist" in Mustang WebAdvisor or by calling Evanston Outreach at 789-3988. It is ultimately the responsibility of the student concerning their position on any given waitlist.

Being on a waitlist does not complete the registration process. Students are not automatically enrolled when a space opens. If you have decided against the waitlisted course, please have your name deleted from the waitlist by using "Managing My Waitlist" in Mustang WebAdvisor or by calling 307-789-3988.

What are the rules if the weather is bad?

If classes are going to be cancelled because of bad weather, announcements will be made on KEVA and KNYN.

What do I do if I have concerns about a class?

How do I get a transcript from Western?

You may pick up a form from the Evanston Outreach Office, call (307-382-1641), request one online at www.wcc.wy.edu or fax campus (307-382-1636). There is no charge for transcripts.

How do I find out what I still need to graduate from Western?

Contact Allen Calmes in the Evanston Outreach Office. He will do an initial degree check for you and send it to Rock Springs campus. An official check can then be done. You should apply for graduation the semester prior to the semester you plan to complete. This gives you time to make adjustments the last semester if needed.

WWCC encourages you to attend the on-campus commencement ceremony held each year in May.

How do I find out my grades?

You can access your grades (as well as transcripts and other academic information) on Mustang WebAdvisor. Log onto www.wcc.wy.edu and go to Mustang Cruiser, log in, and click on Mustang WebAdvisor. You will need to have your log in and password to get access to your account. If you need your log in and password, contact 789-3988 or 307-382-1637. Grades are available shortly after finals week.

Grades will not be mailed to students unless special requests are made to Registration & Records at 307-382-1637.

Course Numbering System

Courses at Western Wyoming Community College are identified by a set of numbers and letters. The letters are abbreviations representing departments on campus (for example; art). The set of 4 numbers indicates the level of the course: 1000s are freshman, 2000s are sophomore, and 0000s are non-transferable courses. **Courses numbered less than 1000 are nontransferable, non-graduation courses.**

Notice to Students

Instruction will occur at the first class meeting. Come prepared for an exciting learning experience.

Unattended Children

For safety and liability reasons, WWCC cannot assume responsibility for children left unattended in the buildings. Parents are encouraged to find an alternative place for their children while attending classes.

Each term we reluctantly have to cancel courses because of low enrollment only to find out the day of the first class that several of you intended to enroll. - **Associate of Arts and Associate of Science Degree requirements that meet or exceed general education requirements at regional four-year schools.**

Keys to a Successful Transfer Planning

- Select a major fairly early in the process.
- While investigating majors, be sure you enroll in general education courses appropriate to any major.
- Until you've selected a major, enroll in courses appropriate to any major.
- Select a transfer institution early. Keep a catalog from the school readily accessible during WWCC advising sessions.
- Use your WWCC faculty advisor as a resource and referral agent.
- Call Al Calmes, 789-0519, Registration & Records or Student Learning on the Rock Springs campus with any questions.

Knowledge/Awareness

- Know the WWCC catalog.
- Be aware that developmental coursework (numbered <1000) is not meant to transfer and does not count towards WWCC AA, AS, ADN, and AFA degrees.
- There are a limited number of elective hours in any program.
- Be aware that occupational courses are generally not meant to transfer.

Watch Your Grades

- Generally, grades less than "C" do not transfer (particularly if they are general education requirements).
- Many transfer institutions require a certain cumulative GPA for transfer students.
- WWCC requires a 2.00 GPA for graduation.

Watch Your Hours

- Generally a maximum of 70 hours transfer from WWCC to a four-year institution.



UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING

Students who plan to transfer from WWCC to the University of Wyoming should be aware of a number of things that make the process a simple matter.

1. **Transfer Agreement for WWCC Graduates:** WWCC graduates with an AA or AS will transfer to UW under a guaranteed agreement. The agreement states that WWCC graduates will have met all of UW's lower division general education (called University Studies at UW) requirements with the exception of a second math requirement. Students can complete the second mathematics course either at WWCC or at the University.
2. **Course Numbering System is the Same:** UW and all 7 Wyoming Community Colleges use the same name and number for all equivalent transfer courses. Thus, English 1010 has the same name and number at all 8 schools. To know which courses are equivalent, use the Transfer Guide (see below).
3. **Transfer Guide:** The Transfer Guide lists all the courses that transfer from the 7 community colleges to UW. It lists equivalent courses and transfer courses. *Equivalent* courses have the same name and number at all 8 institutions. *Transfer* courses transfer to UW even though they may not be taught at all colleges or at UW. The Guide also lists all of UW's general education requirements (University Studies Program) and which courses meet those requirements. All advisors and Registration & Records have copies of the *Transfer Guide*.
4. **No Limit on Number of Credit Hours That Transfer:** There is no limit to the number of credits WWCC students may transfer to UW; however, how these courses fulfill requirements specific to a UW program of study will be evaluated on a course-by-course basis.
5. **Transfer Agreement for Students Who Transfer Without an AA or AS:** Students who transfer with less than an AA or AS degree or with an occupational degree, or other associate degree, will have their transcript evaluated on a course-by-course basis based on the *Transfer Guide*. Such students will have to meet UW's general education requirements, i.e. complete WWCC courses that meet UW's University Studies requirement. Students should notify their advisor if they plan to transfer to UW without completing an AA or AS.

Completing a Bachelors or Masters in Evanston

NOTIFICATION OF STUDENT RIGHTS UNDER THE FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (See WWCC Catalog for more complete information regarding FERPA)

FERPA (also known as the Buckley Amendment) was originally passed in 1974. It has been amended several times since, but the essence remains unchanged. Primary rights for students under FERPA include:

1. Right to inspect and review educational records within 45 days of the day the request is received. Submit your request in writing to the Registration & Records Office.
2. Right to seek to amend educational records. If you think that something in your file is inaccurate, you may make a written request to have that record changed.
3. Right to have some control over the disclosure of information from educational records except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.
4. Right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by WWCC to comply with the requirements of FERPA.

WESTERN WYOMING COMMUNITY COLLEGE EVANSTON OUTREACH PROGRAMS FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

Evanston High School students that are 16 years of age or older may register for college classes through the Western Wyoming Community College Evanston Outreach.

Concurrent Enrollment Classes: Concurrent enrollment classes are taught at the high school. Students registered for concurrent classes receive both college and high school credit. Concurrent enrollment students pay no tuition or textbook fees and classes follow the school district calendar. To be eligible for concurrent enrollment, students must be at least 16 years of age and achieved junior class standing. There are ACT test score requirements or COMPASS scores that vary based on the class you are taking. Please check with your high school counselor for more information on concurrent enrollment classes. A list of the high school concurrent classes can be located on page 11.

Dual Credit Classes: High school students that meet the age and placement testing requirements may register for college classes taught at the Evanston Outreach and receive both high school and college credit.

High School Advanced Placement (AP) Classes: Evanston High School offers a number of Advanced Placement classes that do not automatically qualify students for college credit upon successful completion of the class. Near the end of an AP class, students that registered and paid in advance are given the opportunity to take a nationally standardized test. College credit is awarded based on each student's test score.

Things to Consider before Enrolling for Concurrent or Dual Credit classes:

- Do I meet the age and academic requirements?
- Do I understand that the grade I earn will go on my permanent college transcript?
- Have I checked with the colleges I plan to attend upon high school graduation to determine their policy for transferring concurrent enrollment credit?
- Should I visit with a college advisor before making a decision to enroll for concurrent or dual credit classes?

DISTANCE EDUCATION

Western knows that many of you cannot work dedicated class time into your busy schedule. It may be impossible for you to come to class at a regular time each week. For this reason, we offer a variety of courses via technology that either meet regularly or allow you to complete coursework during your free time, even if that is in the middle of the night.

Internet Courses

Internet courses are **NOT self-paced**. They will:

- Start on the first day of normal classes,
- Have regular deadlines,
- Require interaction with the instructor and fellow students.

To succeed in an Internet class, you will:

- Need to be online a minimum of 3 days a week,
- Be able to study at least 9 hours per week for a 3 credit course,
- Have strong time-management skills, computer skills, and self-motivation.

You MUST:

- Have access to the Internet and MS Word 2003 or higher.
- Use the e-mail address provided to you by the college.
- Go to [http://www.wvcc.wy.edu/dist ed/nt.htm](http://www.wvcc.wy.edu/dist%20ed/nt.htm), pick the term and scroll down and look at the special requirements for your desired course.
- Be comfortable with using a computer and MS Word 2003. To brush up on your computer skills, take one of the non-credit online courses.
- Be comfortable sending e-mails with attachments.

If you are new to online learning, please take the "Intro to Online Learning" HMDV 1025, offered in Spring, Summer, and Fall Semesters.

To begin your Internet class on the first day of the semester:

Login using the username and password provided to you by the college.
